
Spanish PDO wines




p: small local producers. P: local branches of external producers.


Production, organization and regulation levels in the PDO wine system of Castile and Leon (Spain)

PDO wine & Conventions

- L. Boltanski & L. Thévenot (1991)
- Seven 'orders' or 'logics' to assess situations, behaviours or goods.
- The <u>industrial firm</u> as a test field.







MY ARGUMENT:

Spanish PDOs have increased their market performance because they have been able to attach these seven attributes to their wines without losing internal coordination along the value chain

(process)

Seven orders of worth for wine qualification

Industrial: EFFICIENCY

- Scientific management
- Skilled staff
- Minimum wine standards
- Huge investment in equipment

Commercial: PROFITABILITY

- Higher average prices
- Wider wine portfolio
- Foreign trade and markets
- Foreign tourism as a leverage

Domestic: TRUST

- Wine tradition
- Attachment to territory
- Wine landscape as an asset

Inspiration: CREATIVITY

Winemaker as a trademark

Public: REPUTATION

- PDO as a collective trademark
- Non-local investment
- wine culture: contests, events

Civic: RESPONSIBILITY

- Rural development
- Local production
- Role of wine cooperatives
- Wine as healthy food

Ecological: SUSTAINABILITY

- Local grapes
- Organic wines
- Grape recovery
